## MSC Student In New York For TV Debut

When the words "Philip Morris Playhouse on Broadway" flash on television screens across the nation Sunday evening, the curtain will rise on the professional career of localite Lee C. Hanson.

Lee, dramatic student at Michigan State College, will play opposite film star Wanda Hendrix in the drama "Temptation."

Winner of the third quarter of the summer cycle of the Philip Morris Intercollegiate Acting Competition, Lee receives a cash award, all expenses paid to New York, a membership in the American Federation of Radio Artists, and an opportunity to try for the Competition's grand finale prize of \$2,000 on Sunday, August 31.
