The Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 219, P. A. 1925, as amended, hereby orders that fishing shall be permitted, except as hereinafter provided, to take or attempt to take fish in the following waters:

Harrietteville hatchery ponds (2) between D. & M. Railway and hatchery building, Alcona County.

Burke Lake, Section 23, T. 3 N. R. 1 W. Clinton County.

Ponds Nos. 1 and 2 at the Hillside State Fish Bearing Ponds, Section 25, T. 6 S. R. 2 W. Hillside County.

1. Fishing shall be lawful during the statutory trout season.

2. Except on Galley Pond fishing shall be limited to the period from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset.

3. On Galley Pond fishing shall be limited to the period from 11:00 noon to 12:00 midnight except on Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays when it shall be permitted from 6:00 A. M. to 12:00 midnight.

4. Artificial flies only shall be used.

5. No boats or rafts shall be placed or used on the ponds or streams.

6. The daily limit shall be two trout except that in the Groves, Galley, Portage, Solon, Manistee, and West Branch ponds it shall be five trout or ten pounds and one trout.

7. On Ponds Nos. 1 and 2 at the Hillside State Fish Bearing Ponds and on Galley Pond each angler shall submit a daily fishing report on forms provided at the ponds.

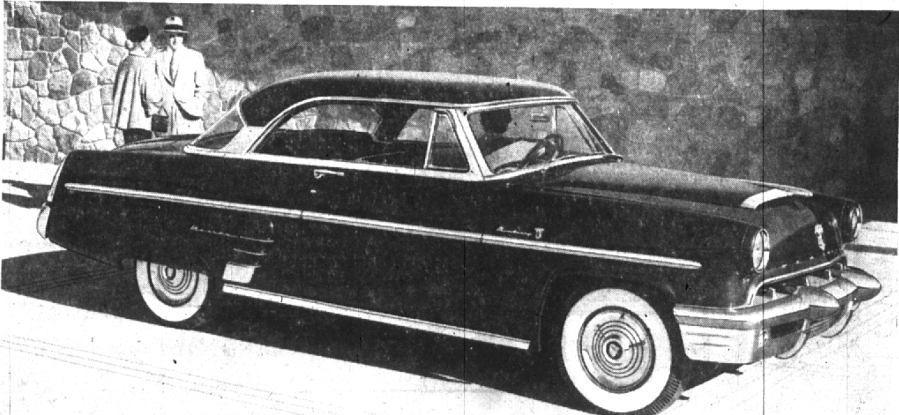
