

FRUITED PORK CHOPS
4 rib pork chops, cut 1 inch thick hold the stuffing better. Stuff each chop with thinly sliced apples and 1 large pitted pruned
Salt and pepper.
Make a pocket in each pork chop by cutting into the chop along the bone. Chops cut from this side hold the stuffing better. Stuff each chop with thinly sliced apples and a pruned. Brown on both sides in a frying pan. Season. Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 45 minutes. 4 servings.

COMPANY MEAT LOAF
1 pound ground beef
1/2 pound bulk pork sausage
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon thyme
1 clove
Combine beef and pork sausage. Add well-beaten egg, milk, bread crumbs, onion, salt, pepper and thyme. Blend thoroughly. Spread mixture in a well-greased 8 x 8 inch square pan. Bake in a 350° F. oven for 60 minutes. Serves 6.

SALT

The perfection of cooked foods depend greatly on using salt at the proper time. Some meats and vegetables should be salted before cooking. Others should be salted just before the cooking time is up. And still others should be soaked in salt water before use.

Roasts, stewing meats, pot roasts, liver and kidney, are among the meats which need to be salted liberally before cooking.

Chick and steaks should be salted as each side is done. Leafy vegetables should be salted after cooking.
