Methodist Society Plans Series of Bible Studies

Under the sponsorship of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist church, Mrs. Maurice Garabrant will open her series of Bible studies on Jan. 7. Subsequent classes will be held each Wednesday, continuing through April. All will be at 11:30 a.m. in the Youth Chapel, according to Mrs. Hugh Hemphill, WSCS president.

The opening session is scheduled to be immediately after a meeting of the executive board. The afternoon session, to be preceded by a luncheon served by the Cora Simpson group, will feature an address by the Rev. A. R. Howard. The pastor of the Mary Palmer church will speak on "Home Missions Winning Human Rights."

Mrs. Garabrant, in her opening class, will sketch the Jewish interpretation of God in the Old Testament and the progress of that relationship as it extends into the New Testament.

"We will observe," she says, "that it has never been completely a man's world. Women have functioned in crises of history all through Biblical history."

"This can be observed as we read about Jael the murderer and Sisera, her victim. And, as we discuss the 'Joan of Arc' in the Book of Judges."

"We want to discover that the Bible is more than a tourist guidebook for moral living. This point is where too many women, especially young mothers, stop using the Bible."

A well-known religious lecturer, Mrs. Garabrant has studied widely, including Hamilton college, Transylvania university, University of Illinois and Columbia.

Her instructions have been received from Dr. Hyatt, an author.
