City Questions Address Listing By City Workers

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night decided to find out just how much time is spent by city employees in addressing special and private business mailings direct from the city's list of water service customers.

Water department Addressograph plates, a valuable aid to charities and commercial organizations in publicizing services or mail, have been comparatively busy the past several years and city employees are the ones who do the addressing of the mailings.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert explained to commissioners that the plates had been used in the past primarily for real estate people and charitable institutions. Egbert cited the Community House and League of Women Voters as specific examples of non-profit organizations that have used the lists.

HE FURTHER reported that 4 of a cent per name is charged to charitable groups and one cent per name to commercial firms.

"Although it is a money-making venture," Egbert said, "it does pose some problems in our office. If I believe if we give the service to one group, we should give it to any organization that requests it."

Elmer Haack, city assessor, recalled that a recent listing brought

the city treasury \$61 for seven hours of work.

Egbert added that the city did not have enough employees to make a big business out of the address plates.

COMMISSIONER V. R. Watkins stated that cities in New York state furnish addresses to city lists at a fixed fee to everyone but that the utility companies refuse to make their lists available.

Watkins added: "I think the utilities are right and we are dead wrong."

"I think we are competing with private business. This work and don't think we should do so," Watkins continued, "Let these people look at our records. But don't furnish the work for them."

Commissioners Ralph A. Main and Lance Minor agreed with Watkins' stand.

Mayor Dean Beier asked Haack to report to the commission on the charitable groups that have used the lists and come up with his recommendation on what action should be taken in the future on these requests.

Fire Department Called Out 39 Times Last Month

Birmingham's fire department made 39 runs during November, with property damages estimated at \$650.

The runs, in their three classifications, are 28 for fire and investigations; 7 gas and gas investigation; and 4 first aid.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 434
CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SALE AND DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED PROPERTY AND THE DISPOSITION OF PROCEEDS OF SUCH SALE.

The City of Birmingham Ordinance: Section 1. Whenever any personal property shall be found within the corporate limits of Birmingham, Ala., by any police officer or employee of said City, such property shall be taken into the actual or apparent custody of any person, or held for the owner, with the consent of the owner, if the same shall be found within the time of holding of the found, and the place where said property shall be found, such books as shall be found in the possession of the City of Birmingham, and shall be open to public examination at all times.

Section 2. If the owner of such property be known to the Chief of Police, he shall cause to be served upon such owner a written notice informing him that his property has been found, and in possession of the Police Department, which service may be by personal service or by registered mail.

Section 3. If any such personal property shall not be claimed by the lawful owner thereof within a period of sixty days, the Chief of Police shall cause the same to be appraised by one or more disinterested appraisers, and record the appraisal value in a newspaper, and shall then cause said property to be sold at public auction, reserving the right to reject any or all bids. Notice of the time and place of said sale shall be given by posting of such notice in at least three public places in the City of Birmingham, and publishing such notice for not less than two publications in a newspaper of general circulation within said City. Said notice shall set forth a description of the property.

Section 4. Proceeds of this Ordinance regarding the time of holding said property shall not be applicable in the case of perishable produce, and the same may be sold within seventy-two hours of its receipt, and the proceeds of this Ordinance shall in no wise be applicable to dogs, nor to the remains intended to be used for the purpose of cremation.

Section 5. Such sale shall be under the direction of the Chief of Police, and shall receive all proceeds therefrom, and forthwith remit the same to the City Treasurer, to be held in the General Fund of the City of Birmingham. The City of Birmingham may purchase property at said sale by the personal service or by registered mail.

Section 6. If any such personal property shall not be claimed by the lawful owner thereof within a period of sixty days, the Chief of Police is hereby authorized to deliver possession of such property to the successful purchaser upon payment of the full purchase price in full, without any covenant of warranty whatsoever, and the purchaser shall be deemed to have accepted said property subject to the rights of the owner, if such rights may be properly proved.

Section 7. Any person who violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before a Court of competent jurisdiction shall be punishable by a fine of not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment in the City or County Jail for a period not to exceed thirty days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

Section 8. The several provisions of this Ordinance shall be severally enforceable, and the holding of any one or more of the provisions shall not thereby impair the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 9. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith, if any, are hereby repealed, insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 10. This Ordinance shall be effective upon publication following the passage hereof.
