Complications arise when the masters (Dick Booth, Don Russert, John Weil, Jim August) find the girls attractive, as do the older students (Ralph Himmelhoch, Todd Corley).

THE GIRLS demoralize the stu-

dents by planning midnight parties, and by enticing twenty-three boys from the dormitory. Finally the Headmaster (Ward Just, Buddy Moore) cracks down, and the girls and their champion are to be expelled, when help arrives from an unexpected source, with Sir Berkeley Nightingale proving the aid.

The cast of 30 has been directed by Carl G. Wonsberger, Director of the Cranbrook Summer Theatre, and the set has been prepared under the direction of Richard Hintermeister. Both performances are open to the public.
