## Dr. Gutteridge to Address the AAUW Child Study Group

Dr. Mary V. Gutteridge, head of the department of Early Childhood Education at Merrill-Palmer School for the past ten years, will speak to the Child Study group on February 19.

The AAUW-sponsored group will meet at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the Baldwin Public Library.

Dr. Gutteridge will speak on "What the Nursery School Can Do." She has had firsthand experience in nursery education in many countries, and is at present writing a book describing her life work in this field.

An active member of the AAUW and the Association for Childhood Education International, Dr. Gutteridge will retire from her position at Merrill-Palmer this year.

She is planning to return to her native Australia where the Mary Gutteridge Lecture in Child Development was established, honoring her pioneer work in that field.

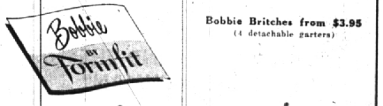

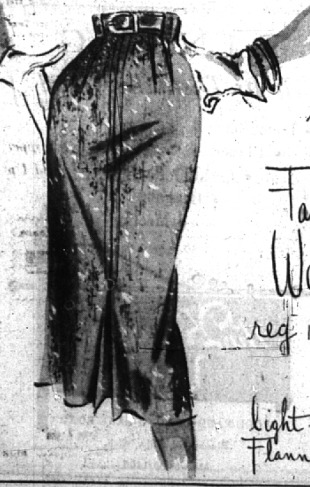
