He stated, "Blood typing can save time in administering blood transfusions to victims who are injured in accidents, fires and other disasters."

"In about two months after the typing program, plastic dog tags will be sent to those typed, stating the blood type, RH factor, name, address and religion."

MONDAY, FEB. 25, typing will be done at the high school for students only from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Parents who sent slips to the high school will be typed there the same day from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m.

A team will be at Big Beaver school from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 26 to accommodate students. Parents who sent slips to that school will report the same day from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Log Cabin and Poppleton school students will be typed at the Log Cabin school Wednesday, Feb. 27 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Parents sending slips to Log Cabin will be typed there from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Another team will be at the high school Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 12. Students typed will be from Troy Union, Troy two, Smith and Colrain schools. Parents who returned slips to these schools will report at the high school from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m.
