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Exhibit Century Of Communication

A local resident, Frank R. Davis, 564 Townsend, has organized a century of communication showing at the Henry Ford Museum at Greenfield Village which will last from Feb. 23 to April 20.

Davis, who is curator of mechanical arts for the Village, has been in charge of the selection of material for the showing which is called "Words on Wings."

The exhibit which covers 10,000 square feet, will feature the old and new in communication. Much of the original radio, telephone and telegraph equipment has been reassembled and put into actual working condition Davis pointed out.

HE STATED, "This display has been selected as illustrative of the development of the art of communication in this century during the past century. It will be of special interest to science, history and sociology instructors and classes."

One of the features will be a working replica of the experimental telegraph built by Samuel F. B. Morse in 1837. On display will be the original telegram message sent at the opening of the Washington-Baltimore line which read, "What hath God wrought?"

Besides the development of radio, telephone, telegraph and television methods, an historical exhibit of early communication methods has been arranged.

Davis said that visitors will be able to operate a Marconi radio transmitter and observe a receiver identical to the equipment which sent and received the first message to span the Atlantic, Dec. 12, 1901.

PROBABLY FEW people know that the first television apparatus was designed in 1888. This early equipment of the rotating prism and scanning disk type will be shown and can be compared with the iconoscope of the present day TV camera.

Devices from the Edison collection which have been restored to working condition will be shown. These include a quadruplex system permitting the sending of four messages simultaneously over one wire, a system of exchanging messages between moving trains by induction.

The curator said that much of the communication apparatus hasn't had current through them for at least 50 years.

The exhibit will be one of the most complete communication displays ever shown in this country. Hours are 9 to 5 daily.

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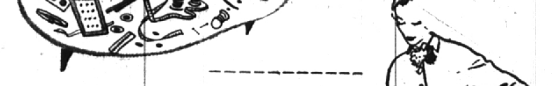
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
