Maple Swim Squad Downs Univ. High

Despite the record smashing efforts of University high school's ace Bill Schuelie the Birmingham tank team took a satisfying 48-36 victory at Barnum pool last week.

Schuelie cracked two three-year-old Barnum pool records, one in the 100 yard breast stroke and one in the 100 yard free style. The new breast stroke record of 1:07.3 was a half second faster than the former mark held by Ron Ridge of Pontiac and his freestyle time bettered the record held by John Flynn of Clenshaw by one-tenth of a second. The new record is :56.8.

The 100 YARD freestyle was the most exciting event of the afternoon with Hank Star, Gary Osterbeck finishing only a stroke behind the record-breaking Schuelie.

Jerry Fletcher gave his usual consistent performance, winning both the back stroke and the individual medley to be Birmingham's only double winner.

University High was leading by three points, until the superior diving performances of Larry Coleman and Roger Hood put the Maples out front where they stayed until the finish.

When the half ended, the Maples enjoyed a 34-23 lead, the widest point spread of the evening, but at the cost of four personal fouls apiece on scrappy guards Stu Scheifele and Tom Tracy.

At the opening of the second half, the Big Red started to hit, pouring in shots from almost every angle and by the end of the third stanza forged third in the point lead.

In danger of fouling out, Scheifele and Tracy were forced to play cautiously until Scheifele left the game in the final period with five personals.

The Maples played a fair floor game and were very aggressive but were erratic in shooting. Shots went around the rim, over the rim, and some even went in and out as the locals connected on only 22 of 92 attempts for a low 24%.

The defeat gave the Maples a season record of seven wins and five defeats and all but ruined chances for finishing third in the Eastern Michigan league.
