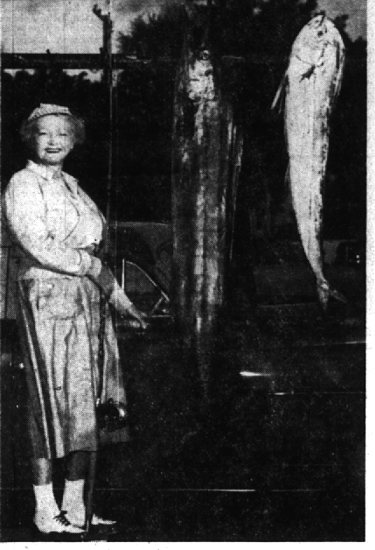
The groom's mother was in taupe satin, accented by her purple hat and accessories.
