

Red Cross Meeting Held at Christ Church

At the quarterly meeting of the Oakland County Red Cross Chapter, Robert Edson urged that all Americans "answer the call" in the forthcoming American Red Cross campaign for funds. The campaign "kick-off" dinner and meeting was held Feb. 20 at Christ Church Cranbrook.

Edson, who is director of disaster, preparedness and relief for the midwestern area of the Red Cross, said in his speech: "The national goal this year is \$85,000,000 and your local goal is \$115,000.00. Those who contribute to the Red Cross find in its services a practical expression of the finest impulses of the human heart. . . concern for misfortunes and needs of their fellow men."

"Through Red Cross services, both the shattered homes and the means of livelihood to victims of disaster are restored; servicemen and their families are helped through emergencies both great and small."

"THERE IS NO price tag on mercy, on the saving of a human life or on the good will and friendliness that makes us a strong unified nation. . . it is the speaker, 'Helping your neighbor voluntarily is demonstration of democracy at work.'"

Dr. Benedict Glazer, Rabbi of Temple Beth-El in Detroit, spoke on "The High Cost of Living," which he explained is "not the

high cost economically but the high cost emotionally."

"Although we tax ourselves greatly in daily living, we have an opportunity to replenish our capital reserve through service to others. Although it is best to give of ourselves, to give of our substance is equally praiseworthy."

Approximately 100 persons were present for the meeting called by Gar A. Swezey, chairman of the 1952 Fund Campaign drive for the Red Cross. Those attending represented Pontiac, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Royal Oak, Ferndale, Southfield, Royal Oak Township, Waterford Township, Huntington Woods and Pleasant Ridge.

AT THE MEETING Mrs. H. Rodriguez of Royal Oak reported that 32 authorized home nursing instructors are available in Oakland County. In the past 18 months, the chapter has issued 1,840 home nursing certificates at the average cost of \$2.50 per certificate to the chapter.

Carroll Nussey of Macceady Lake reported that in the past year home service has expended a total of \$7,851 or 20% of the budget to care for 4,121 cases. Mrs. J. C. Walker, chairman of service groups, reported on volunteer activities in the chapter during the past year.

MRS. JOHN HINCKLEY of Birmingham reported that 69 schools have enrolled in the Junior Red Cross. These schools packed and sent 437 gifts overseas and contributed \$500 to the International Children's Fund. In her report, Mrs. E. L. Bradley, chairman of blood donor services, said that in 24 mobile visits, the chapter has secured 3,154 pints of blood. . . 210 pints of whole blood were issued to patients in local hospitals and 235 units of plasma were also made available to local patients. To the armed forces, the county sent 2,954 pints of blood.

In connection with the fund campaign, Swezey explained that the March campaign would solicit all areas not covered by various fund campaigns in the fall; namely, businesses and industries allowing the single payroll deduction.

MRS. BRADLEE PRUDEN of Birmingham, vice-chairman of volunteers, reported on the expenditures of contributed money by the national organization. Mrs. J. C. Walker, chairman of service groups, reported on volunteer activities in the chapter during the past year.

City Holds Up Payment On Old Garbage Contract

City Manager Donald C. Egbert told commissioners Monday that the city of Birmingham was deducting \$186 from the \$277.96 due John Basch, Jr. for garbage. The amount will reimburse the city for the use of its equipment and personnel during the last week of the Basch contract which expired Dec. 31.

Egbert explained that many complaints were received on the service Basch was giving and considerable difficulty was experienced when the new contract was let Jan. 1, 1952. Commissioners decided a balance of \$186, which would be paid the new contractor for additional work performed, will be temporarily retained.

School to Buy Tractor

Birmingham's school board has approved the purchase of an additional Ford tractor for snow removal and grounds maintenance. The purchase will be made from the Pontiac Implement Sales company which quoted a price of \$1,445.81.
