East Detroit Romps to Win Over Locals

Sparked by Ron Kramer's record-breaking performance, East Detroit high school's basketball team wallowed Birmingham 34-44 Friday evening in the Baldwin gym.

Giant junior center and a leading candidate for all-state laurels, Kramer garnered 17 field goals and three free throws for 37 points, a new record. His performance put him far ahead in the race for the state class A scoring crown.

WITH KRAMER controlling the backboards, East Detroit raced to an early lead. The Shamrocks, a well-balanced and classy-looking outfit, had too much height and shooting accuracy for Birmingham. The Maples couldn't get their offense rolling and trailed 36-12 at halftime.

In the second half, the locals found their poise on offense, scoring 32 points. Guard Tom Tracy popped in 14 tallies, mostly on shots from far out on the floor.

East Detroit kept up its torrid pace, however, to hand the Maples their sixth defeat of the season as against seven wins. The Shamrocks had a stalling .404 percentage on field goals.

In winning, the Shamrocks, rated one of the top 10 teams in the state, clinched second place in the Eastern Michigan league, the highest the school has ever finished.

Crane Hockey Team Nets Two More Wins During Week

Cranebrook's Hockey team, having played three games in three days won two and lost one last week.

Last Thursday, Cranebrook defeated Emmert Chevrolet of Detroit 3 to 2 in a thrilling overtime contest. Rufe Reitzel of Cranebrook tallied the winning goal in the first minute of a sudden-death overtime period. Harry Lomax and Dave Hubbard scored in the regulation time. In the next, Star High stopped 17 shots for the Cranes.

Friday, Cranebrook faced the best team it has played all year—a group of Canadian-born youngsters from Lincoln High School in Ferndale. The Lincoln team won 4-2 in a hard fought battle that was not decided until Lincoln scored in the last minute of play. For Cranebrook, Reitzel scored twice and Hubbard once.

Saturday morning, Cranebrook met Kelly's Hardware of Pontiac. Cranebrook's Sharpshooters finally found their eyes as they scored three times to Kelly's. Howard Parker hit the nets 4 times for Cranebrook. Larry Asbury smashed 2 goals and Jim Patterson, Dave Williams and Dick Deskin tallied one each.
