## Distribution of Weight, Gas Tax Funds Announced

Vouchers for distribution of \$22,209,237.35 collected in weight and gas taxes for the fourth quarter of the calendar year 1951 have been prepared by the State highway department and sent to the Auditor General's office for payment, according to State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler.

This distribution is in accordance with provisions of Act 51, Public acts of 1951.

ACCORDING TO THE report, Birmingham will receive \$18,587.77 and Bloomfield Hills, \$6,484.49. Oakland County will collect \$411,998.89, which will be used for upkeep of county and township roads.

The state highway department receives 44% of the money after deductions for the cost of collecting the funds and refunds to purchasers of gasoline which is used for non-highway purposes. Cities and villages of the state receive 19% of the fund and counties the remaining 37%.

As their share of the fourth quarter collections the highway department receives \$9,772,064.43, cities and incorporated villages, \$4,219,755.10 and counties, \$8,217,417.82.
