

Civil Defense Reorganized

Birmingham Civil Defense Director Col. Bruce Booth has submitted names of six persons to the governor for appointment to the local defense council. The list includes: Col. Booth, chairman; Major Earl P. Sandquist, vice-chairman; City Clerk Miss Irene E. Hanley, secretary; Lt. Comm. Donald C. Eckert, city manager; Vernon W. Griffith, fire chief; and Ralph W. Moxley, chief of police.

Certain revisions are being made in the local defense organization to comply with recent state directives, Booth stated.

TO ESTABLISH uniformity with the state and federal civil defense organizations, the plan for the local organization as suggested by the federal government has been adopted.

Appointed to head up the divisions are Moxley, police facilities, self protection; Griffith, fire; Dr. Robert B. Wessels, medical; Norman T. Knapp, public works; L. R. Gare, utilities; and city Health Nurse Avice Gillette, welfare.

Maury Wyss was named as special assistant to the director for public relations.

Booth stated, "We appreciate the numerous offers of assistance from Birmingham residents and civic organizations to serve in the civil defense program. All names are being recorded and duty assignments will be made from time to time as the organization progresses."
