Petitions Ask Improvements on Graefield Road

Two petitions for public improvements of Graefield road from Derby to Pembroke and south from Pembroke one-half block were presented to the city commission last week Wednesday evening and then referred to the city manager.

One petition requests that the street be oiled and kept oiled until such time as it is paved. The second asks that the street be paved and that the city take the necessary steps to get the work accomplished.

Membership of Little League Baseball Grows

WILLIAMSPORT, PA.: The number of Little Leagues increased more than 150% in 1951, according to the annual report of the baseball group, submitted to the board of directors by Commissioner Carl Stutz.

A total of 774 leagues operated in 38 states as well as Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, Cuba, Canal Zone and Porto Rico in the season just completed as compared with 306 leagues which were franchised in 1950, the report stated.

Stutz estimates that in 1952 more than 2,000 leagues will be franchised with approximately 250,000 boys playing under Little League rules in 1951 there were 60,000.

FOR THE FIRST time, a Little League baseball loop was organized in Birmingham, last summer. Little League is a non-profit corporation which provides organized baseball for boys of ages 8 to 12.

Dr. J. C. Moloney Announces Book On Mental Health

A greater sense of security and affection in infancy and childhood is necessary if we are to successfully combat the ever-increasing battle for mental health, is the theory expressed by Dr. J. Clark Moloney, noted psychiatrist in his most recent book, "The Battle for Mental Health."

Dr. Moloney, who resides at 240 Daines, is one of the founders of the Corbellan Corner, and a staunch advocate of greater association between mothers and their children, especially during the first two years.

His appeal to parents is for a return to the ways of their grandparents and great-grandparents as far as their associations with their children go. He feels that peaceful and calmer home life can become a great influence in the mental balance of the adult individual.

HE ALSO points out the physical ailments which can arise from nervous tension, the influence it has on the criminal element, excessive drinking, the use of drugs and the suicides of today.

The sense of security and knowledge of love begins at birth, Dr. Moloney points out. He advocates special maternity hospitals, planned to handle no other medical cases, and created around as homey an atmosphere as possible.

Throughout the book, Dr. Moloney stresses the importance of love, affection and peace in the home if we are to even attempt to successfully combat mental illnesses.

\$80,000 Expected in Gas, Weight Tax Revenues to City

Cost of resurfacing North Woodward avenue last year was \$10,900.77, according to City Manager Donald C. Egbert.

In addition, application of seal coating on certain city pavements amounted to \$8,956.48.

These charges will be borne by surplus revenues derived from the city's share of the state gas and weight tax. Egbert said it now appears that the city will receive approximately \$80,000 during the 1951-52 year from this source.

THE CITY MANAGER stated,

"The revenue derived from the gas and weight tax will be credited to city revenue and will create a surplus in this revenue account. This recent resurfacing work should therefore be charged to surplus."

The city previously appropriated \$45,500 for resurfacing pavements. Of this amount, \$40,509.49 was expended, leaving a balance of \$5,190.53. This amount will be utilized to reduce the appropriation required for the North Woodward resurfacing and seal coating work.

J. A. Palmer Promoted By American Surety Co.
