Can Dial More Locations from Birmingham Area

Beginning at 10 p.m. Friday evening the Michigan Bell Telephone Company will put into effect additional calling numbers that may be dialed directly by Birmingham, Center Line and Roseville telephone users.

Birmingham subscribers will be able to dial direct to Amherstburg and Tecumseh in Ontario, Canada. The number prefix for those exchanges are respectively, RED-wood and SE-neck, and telephone there may be reached by dialing the first two letters of the prefix name followed by the desired number.

COINCIDENT WITH the conversion of the Big Beaver exchange to dial operation, Center Line and Roseville users will be able to dial direct to Big Beaver telephones as well as to the two Ontario points available to Birmingham.

The Big Beaver central office prefix will be MTU-berry, and numbers there may be reached by dialing the letters M and U, and followed by the five digits of the number.
