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Maples Drop 44-39 Decision To Hazel Park

Despite a spirited closing scoring rush, the Maple basketball team dropped a 44-39 decision to Hazel Park last Friday night on the Vikings' floor.

Birmingham racked up 16 points in the final period while holding the Vikings to eight, but it was not enough to overcome Hazel Park's big lead and the Maples were handed their second defeat in league competition.

Hazel Park broke in front on a long shot by diminutive guard Bill Patterson. Jim Russell and Mac Clyns took over the scoring duties for the Vikings and pushed them far out ahead on lay-ups and set shots from the floor. Stu Scheffel, tossed in two baskets for Birmingham but most of the Maples' shots were wild and they trailed 21-24 at halftime.

A REJUVENATED BIRMINGHAM team took the floor in the second half. Jim Barger broke through the Vikings' defense for three buckets and Don Jones did some skilled backboard work at the Maples' defense for three points for point in the third quarter.

Gordon Mutch went on a scoring spree in the last period, tossing in four baskets before he was ejected from the game with five personal fouls. Without him, however, the Maples faltered and fell six points short of victory.

The Parkers' Russell capped scoring honors for the evening with 17 points on seven field goals and three free throws. Barger and Mutch scored 13 points apiece for Birmingham.

The Maples dropped considerably in shooting accuracy, hitting on only 23.4% of their field goal attempts and 36% of their free throws. Another factor in the outcome was the absence from the Maple lineup of Tom Tracy, who could not play because of illness. Birmingham's next game is at Port Huron Friday night.
