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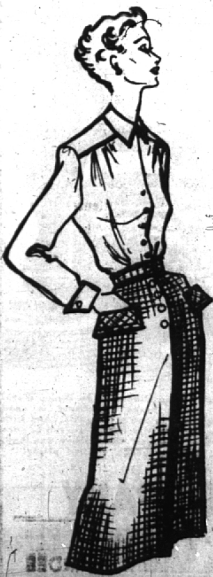
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## Evening of Cards, Dancing Slated For New Residents

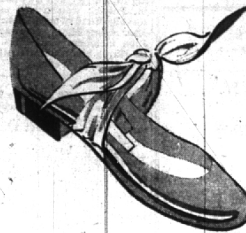
## Jaycees Select New Chairmen
