**PRECINCT NO. 4**—All that property bounded on the north by West Maple Avenue, on the west by Southfield Road, on the south by Lincoln Avenue and on the east by Woodward Avenue.

**PRECINCT NO. 5**—All that property bounded on the north by East Maple Avenue between Woodward Avenue and Adams Road and by Villa Avenue between Adams and the east city limits, on the west by Woodward Avenue, on the south by the city limits and on the east by the city limits and Adams Road.

**PRECINCT NO. 6**—All that property bounded on the north by Lincoln Avenue, on the west by Southfield Road, on the south by the city limits and on the east by Woodward Avenue.

**PRECINCT NO. 7**—All that property bounded on the north by the city limits and East Maple Avenue between the G.T.W.R.R. and Adams Road, on the west by the G.T.W.R.R. and Adams Road, on the south by Villa Avenue and the city limits, and on the east by the city limits.

**PRECINCT NO. 8**—All that property bounded on the north by West Maple Avenue, on the west by the city limits, on the south by the city limits, and on the east by Southfield Road.

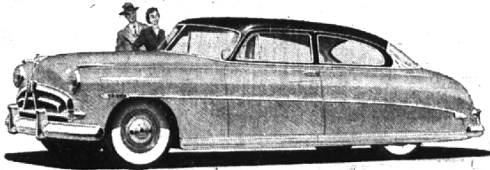
