The meeting will be held in the Lathrup school, Southfield, and 11 1/2 Mile road and will start at 8 p.m. John W. Lemons, 24939 Greenfield, will be in charge of the meeting and will call for action to keep any proposed incinerator out of the west Woodward section.

Practice Sessions Only on New Field

Hopes that the new football field adjoining the new Birmingham high school will be used in the near future must be forgotten.

The new gridiron will not be used for any home games for quite a while, at least until the elementary school situation is relieved.

This is not a case of lack of money, but more a case of putting the available money to a better use.

Norman A. Wolfe, assistant superintendent of schools, said today that compared to the lack of facilities for the younger children in Birmingham, the completion of the new field is a luxury.

The problem of housing the increased number of elementary school children and giving them the proper facilities is serious," Wolfe said.

WHEN WOLFE was asked if the field would be forgotten, he replied, "By no means. As soon as the present situation of the elementary schools is taken care of, work will be started on the new field."

A sudden decrease in elementary school enrollment might affect the plans, but Wolfe considered this unlikely.

The new field will not be idle however, for the team practices will be held on it. The sod is ready but the field needs lights, bleachers, and toilet facilities. The cost of the lights will run well over \$15,000 and with the rest of the facilities the total cost will be about \$30,000 Wolfe estimates.

"IN THE LIGHT of the elementary school problem, to spend that much money right now for the football field would seem foolish, especially for just four games," said Wolfe.

All of the four home games will be played at night and at Pierce field.

The Board of Education feels that the high school students of Birmingham have been given the finest school possible and now the younger children must be considered.

Some fall day in the future the people of Birmingham will thrill to the long touchdown runs and the high spiraling punts and they'll be in their new stadium.

But the education of children into adults is to come first.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION AND SUBMISSION OF CHARTER AMENDMENT PROPOSITION

CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, AND STATE OF MICHIGAN:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a special election will be held in the City of Birmingham, County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, on the 5th day of August, A. D. 1952, from 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon until 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern Standard Time, for the purpose of voting upon the question of the amendment of Section 1 of Chapter XII of the charter of said city so that said section will read as follows:

CHAPTER XII SEWERS AND DRAINS

Section 1. The commission may establish, construct and maintain a sewerage system, sewage disposal system, sewers and drains whenever and wherever necessary. Such systems, sewers and drains may be constructed either within or without the city or partly within and partly without the city. The commission upon a three-fifths vote of the members elect shall have power to contract from time to time with any city, county, metropolitan district or other political subdivision, or any agency of the foregoing, for the disposal of sanitary and/or storm water sewage from the city, for a period not to exceed forty years; provided, that before authorizing the execution of any such contract, the commission shall cause a copy of the same to be deposited with the city clerk and a notice of such deposit to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city at least once not less than ten days prior to such authorization. The contract as so deposited may be amended before execution without further notice. No such contract after it has become effective shall be declared invalid for want of proper notice. The amounts to be paid from time to time by the city under any such contract shall not constitute an indebtedness of the city within the meaning of any charter debt limitation. The commission shall impose rates, charges and/or assessments upon the users and beneficiaries of sewerage disposal services and facilities sufficient to promptly meet the obligations under such contract but in event the receipts therefrom are not sufficient to pay all sums when due under the contract, then the city shall be responsible for any deficit. Such rates, charges and/or assessments shall be made and the payment thereunder enforced, by any method permissible by law. The provisions of this section shall not be limited by those of any other section or sections of this charter.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that said Section 1 now reads as follows:

Section 1. The commission may establish, construct and maintain a sewerage system, sewage disposal system, sewers and drains whenever and wherever necessary. Such systems, sewers and drains may be constructed either within or without the city or partly within and partly without the city. The commission may contract with any other governmental unit or units for sewerage and drainage facilities, provided that the same is approved by two-thirds of the electors voting thereon at a general or special election.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that the polling places for said special election will be the same as those for the General Primary Election to be held on the same day.
