W. Hayward Seeking Congressional Seat

William Hayward, former mayor of Royal Oak in 1945-49, is seeking a seat in Congress from the 14th Michigan district which consists of Oakland county, at the 1952 Republican primary on August 5. He opposes incumbent George Donders and political newcomer Stan Brown of Franklin.

Hayward has been a resident of Oakland County since June, 1929 and is currently secretary and business manager of the Greater Life Insurance Society of Detroit.

In 1939 Hayward was elected as city commissioner and re-elected in 1941 and 1943. He became mayor of Royal Oak in 1946 and 1947 and re-elected as commissioner in November, 1951, which term he is now serving.

HAYWARD was elected to the Republican County Convention as delegate from the 11th precinct, Royal Oak and as delegate to the State Republican Conventions in September, 1949 and in Grand Rapids in February, 1949.

The former mayor was also a member of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors in 1948-1949.

Hayward was member of the Board of the Council of Social Agencies, 1945-1944 in Southern Oakland County, and Chairman of the Board of the Royal Oak General Hospital for 1932.

He is a graduate of Royal Oak High School in 1923 and the American Banker's Association Graduate School of Banking, Rutgers University in 1942.

He believes "Eisenhower's nomination was brought about solely because he is the outstanding choice of the people. With the vigorous and experienced 39-year old Nixon as running mate, it can't help but be a winning team".

'Operation Skywatch' Insurance for Safety

"Operation Skywatch", the 24-hour duty of the Ground Observers Corps, began in Birmingham at 8 a.m. Monday, along with communities in 27 other states throughout the country.

Supervisor Richard Dewey, 219 N. Woodward, said that additional Michigan observers had needed if Birmingham is to "meet its obligation in this period of greater aerial surveillance for aid defense."

"So far the shifts have been operating fairly well," Dewey said. "This will continue though unless we have more workers. With special effort being made by those now working with us, we did have two or three shifts Monday which 'presented difficulty' for us."

"Our present trouble is getting manpower for the night shifts. By having an adequate number of women available for day-time duty we can transfer personnel around to have this around-the-clock schedule which the Air Force has ordered."

In addition to trying to get more workers, we are also looking for a different location for the observer's post. Our present post, on the municipal building, is not ideally suited for women to work because of its extreme exposure to heat and cold.

"TOO, a local ordinance prohibits the presence of ladies above the second floor of the fire department headquarters. We can't get to the tower without breaking the rule."

In an appeal to the public for support of the GOC, Director Lewis C. Jarrendt, Pontiac, quoted Thomas K. Finletter's recent statement.

Finletter, secretary of the Air Force, said "The American people should know the straight facts upon which to base their decision to make the sacrifice which the twenty-four hour surveillance by civilian observers entails."

JARRENT pointed out that no one can foretell how long the present emergency would last. He explained that GOC observers would supplement the nation's radar network in providing a constant air guard.

"Aircraft sighted by observers are reported by phone to a filter center in Grand Rapids which handles many posts in this part of the state. From the center, reports are relayed to the radar network posts where it is combined with the information they have picked up."
