FAIRWAYS YESTERDAY were filled when the second annual men's golf invitational tournament got underway. Prizes were awarded at dinner at the end of the day.

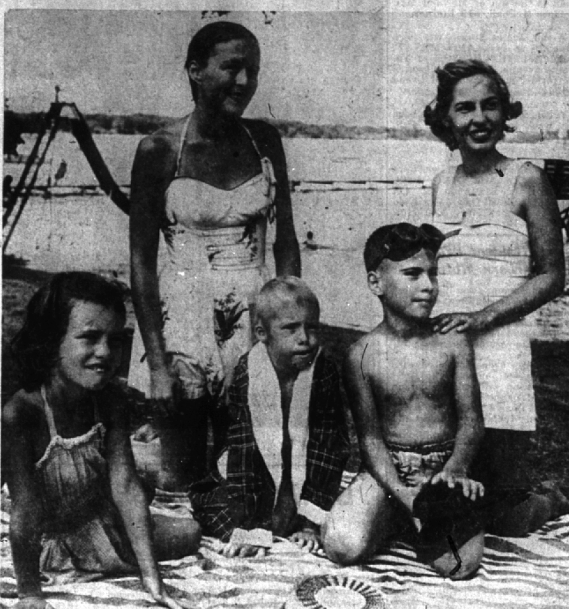
The male golf championship will be decided at the end of the month, with the ladies' trophy being awarded on the basis of August competition.

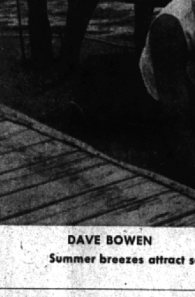
