Wife of Robert Alexander, first secretary of the American Embassy in Tokyo, Mrs. Alexander volunteered for service with the Gray Ladies soon after her arrival in Japan in May, 1951. Her branch of the Red Cross was made appointment as chairman of this last April, assigning her to duty at the 8167 U.S.A. Hospital.

Mrs. Alexander, working under the direction of the professional Red Cross staff at the hospital, is supervising the efforts of the Gray Ladies in recreational and social work for patients.

THE GROUP looks after the personal needs and comforts of sick and wounded men. A part of their job is to help each man tap the resources of his own spirit, mind and body, bringing them into play in order to speed his recovery.

At the award ceremony, Mrs. Alexander presented caps to 23 new Gray Ladies who had completed the 18-hour training course and the required 24 hours of probationary work.

The majority of the group are the wives of American military officers and servicemen on duty in Tokyo.
