Play It Safe! DRY CLEANING— IN THE HOME

The process of dry cleaning a garment, or other fabrics, in the home is one of the most dangerous jobs that can be attempted. The liquid material required for this operation, in some cases, has the highest flash point possible for petroleum products, and most people who attempt this work in their homes do not have the proper knowledge of volatile liquids nor do they have the proper equipment for testing them.

With most people, their first thought in cleaning is to use naphtha and be sure you get this type their volatile, characteristic vaporize faster than any other liquid. Because the fumes are heavier than air, they spill over the top of the cleaning vat or tub and cover the floor area then build up a density throughout the room. The person using this material is never conscious of this density until ignition from a stove, match, light switch or some other source has touched it off. The result is frequently death to the operator and occupants of the home, plus heavy damage to the building.

Recently, approved noninflammable liquids have appeared on the market. The label on the container indicates whether or not the material is safe for home cleaning. If you must do home cleaning, read the label thoroughly and be sure you get this type of cleaning fluid.

"PLAY IT SAFE". The life (or lives) of members of your family are endangered by the chances you take when doing home cleaning with naphtha, gasoline or other highly inflammable liquids.
