Hospital Drive Ends; Ambulant Clinic

Following a meeting of the trustees of Oakland Hospital, Merritt D. Hill, campaign chairman, and E. A. Tomlinson, Oakland Hospital president, today announced the successful completion of fund-raising activities in South Oakland County to complete the financing of the hospital. A total of \$158,516 in cash and pledges has been turned over to the Greater Detroit Hospital Fund as a result of the program which carried out the Oakland Hospital board of trustees' commitment to the Greater Detroit Hospital Fund and qualified Oakland Hospital to receive the \$3,500,000 allocation for general hospital construction. Hill said that in addition, a solicitation among the doctors of the county still in progress and a special committee of the campaign organization will complete contacts with about 20 doctors who have yet to determine the amount of their contribution. Active solicitation has ended with these two exceptions, Hill said. AT THE SAME TIME, Tomlinson announced that preliminary plans for inclusion of an ambulant diagnostic clinic in the Oakland Hospital have been abandoned in view of the controversial character of the special respect to medical staffing and operation, and that final plans call for a fine general hospital. The special committee which was formed to arrange financing of an ambulant diagnostic clinic at least insofar as Oakland Hospital is concerned, Tomlinson said. "This committee therefore will discontinue the effort as part of the Oakland Hospital program. "In a resolution rescinding former action with respect to an ambulant clinic, the trustees approved proceeding forthwith with working drawings for the general hospital. The resolution follows: "RESOLVED THAT the previous action of this board providing for the inclusion in Oakland Hospital of an ambulant diagnostic clinic be and is hereby rescinded, and all necessary action be made to complete as a fine general hospital. While this disagreement in with a full time medical staff, a disagreement, and has impeded the progress of the building of the hospital. Commenting at the trustee meeting, Tomlinson expressed the trustees' appreciation of the work that has been carried out over a period of years by McGregor and his associates on the board. "These men, being businessmen who face facts but who still want to see their ideals realized, have made the only choice they could make. They are endeavoring to make it possible for Oakland Hospital to supply the need which others think is paramount in this area—that of providing a substantial number of additional beds in a fine general hospital—and to have such a plan forwarded without opposition. "While to their minds such a project is not as great a looking as one which would put greater emphasis on an ambulant diagnostic clinic, which so many excellent authorities regard to be the medical center of tomorrow, they withdrew with all goodwill so that we may proceed to meet the needs of today."
