Open Hunt Club Draws Riders to Annual Show

Neither heat, humidity nor television ruffled the performance at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club on East Long Lake road last weekend.

388 horses went through their paces during the four day event, and more than 20,000 spectators lined the fences for the 35th annual show.

Riders came from all over the country to take home trophies and ribbons, competing through the day and under the lights into the night.

The only concession to the heat was a flurry of oddly-assorted hats that footsoted the rails. And many a rider's first action on dismounting was to slip off the boots and change into a far-cooler pair of "sneakers."

ACCIDENTS WERE few. With the exception of Sally Busch of St. Louis, Mo., the greatest blow suffered was to equestrian pride. Miss Busch required several stitches.

Entries this year included jumpers, hunters, saddle and harness horses and Western breeds. Several major events were judged under the rules of the famed Federal Equestrian International, known to horse show patrons as FEL.

G. Fred Morris, as in four previous years, was president of the show. Working with him were vice-presidents John E. Davis and Harry S. Nichols, with Ray E. Lawlor, treasurer, and Mrs. Maxwell D. Millard, secretary.

Committee heads included Mrs. Everett E. Fisher, entertainment; Frank C. McGinnis and Norman H. Strouse, program and advertisement; James P. Chapman, publicity; Harold J. Havermale, ring; Roy C. Pulver, grounds; and Wendell S. Smith, stabling.

Others assisting with arrangements were Mrs. E. J. Anderson, Washburne Wright, Walter O. Briggs, Jr., William D. Downey and Carlton Highie.

CLIMAX of the contest was the judging of championships in the various events. Winning the junior hunter championship was Sequoia, ridden and owned by 14-year-old Sally Moeling of Chicago. Reserve champion in that class was Frank H. Duffy's Blue Bonnet.

Sally also won a trophy of particular interest to localites, the Joan Coulson Memorial Cup for her victory in Thursday's Open Hunting class.

Pike's Peak, owned by Fox Covert Farm, took the top award in the hunting championship preliminary and went on to win in the final. Mrs. Hugh Gentry's Copperfield was the reserve champion. Pike's Peak also won the hunter stake, the model hunter event, and first place for hunters under saddle.

WITH THE AINSWORTH trophy at stake, Miss Warlock, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Burke captured the green hunter championship, with Mrs. Myron E. Mertry's Geraldine the reserve winner. Miss Warlock also took first place in the green hunter under saddle event, and the light green hunters class.

Sequoia, again ridden by Sally Moeling, barely nosed out Betty Yaw's Chicabelle in the working hunter championship.

Junior championship, always a high spot in the show, was won by Susie Lucenti's Happy Day, with Mountain Breeze, owned by the John Wallaces of Northville, the reserve winner.

Miss Lucenti also added the ladies' hunter award to her collection when her Central Award topped that class.

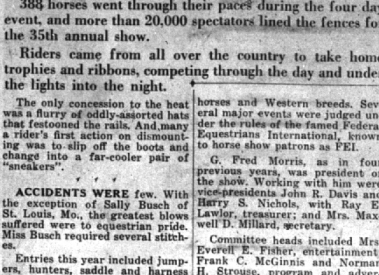
