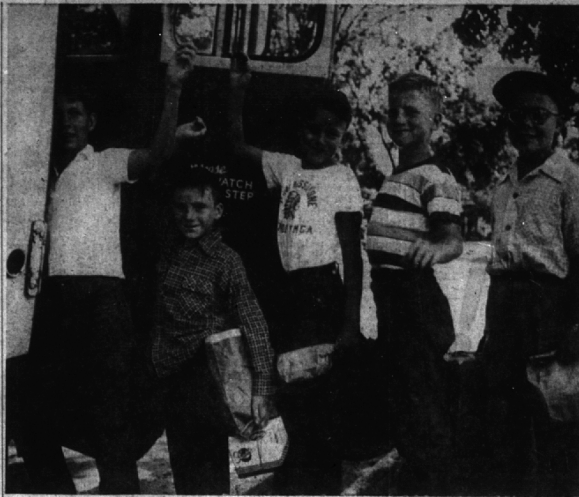

JOSEPH HARTMANN, 50, of 1898 East Maple, died suddenly at his home July 23.

A native of Budapest, Hungary, he was born Dec. 17, 1902. He had been a resident of Birmingham for about two years, coming here from Detroit. Mr. Hartmann was a member of the sales staff at the Detroit store of Grinnell Brothers.

HARRY W. DEMPSEY, 54, for 16 years associated with the Pontiac-Cadillac agency in Birmingham, died July 28 at Mt. Carmel hospital in Detroit, following a long illness.

Mr. Dempsey was made sales manager of the Wilson Pontiac-Cadillac agency here in 1950. Born in Dublin, Ireland, on May 9, 1898, Mr. Dempsey was a resident of Watkins Lake.

With the exception of five years in a sales position with a California firm, he has been associated with the automotive industry since 1923.

He was a member of the Birmingham Lions club, Elks lodge in Pontiac, Army Ordnance association and the Watkins Lake Improvement association which he had served as an officer. He was also active on the Labor Relations board in Lansing.

Besides his widow, Helen, Mr. Dempsey is survived by a brother, Edward Dempsey of Birmingham; four sisters, Mrs. Thomas Lewis and Mrs. William Loes of Longdon, Eng. Mrs. May Bell of Dublin and Mme. Roland Chatterlain of France.
