Zoning Petition Given Planners

The city commission Monday referred a rezoning petition of Cecil F. Charlton, 119 South Adams, to the plan board for report and recommendation.

The petition is to rezone the southeast corner of Maple and Adams from single residence to multiple dwelling.

Commissioners once more discussed the advisability of referring each zoning change request to the plan board.

Commissioner V. B. Watkins held that the commission should be the body to study and decide the fate on zoning changes.

His opinion was opposed by Mayor/Dean G. Beier and City Manager Donald C. Egbert, who agreed that the plan board, interested in the planning of each complete area of the city, should have the chance to learn of these zoning matters.

To Call Hearing On Eton Widening

A public hearing on the widening of Eton between Sheffield and Lincoln will be set by the city commission at next Monday night's meeting.

Commissioners decided Monday night to complete the widening of the present 18 foot strip of pavement rather than make refunds to the builder, Edward Rose and Sons.

The width of the pavement widening will be set when engineering studies of the street have been made.

Upon a contractual agreement between the builder and the city when the property was purchased, the city promised to widen the street within nine months after completion of the property sale.

City commissioners, recognizing the amount of traffic carried by this street, wanted to widen it to 30 feet. This width met with resident opposition.

Forester Explains Elm Tree Shedding

City Forester William Leibold said Monday that the sudden leaf-shedding of elm trees in several sections of the city was probably due to recent spraying.

In an effort to combat and halt any case of Dutch elm disease in Birmingham, city forestry crews have sprayed in several areas. Leibold said it was his opinion that the spray would not cause a leaf drop, and that foresters in Detroit and Lansing had agreed.

He checked further, getting the opinion of a tree surgeon training school, and was informed that the spray used would cause this, especially in the Chinese elms.

"The Chinese elm apparently has a thinner leaf," Leibold said, "and was not able to withstand the strength of the spray, which checked several other species and found no trouble with them."

"The owners of these trees should be informed that this is not permanent. There's a possibility that these trees will have a new crop this year, too."

"The excessive heat and dryness of the summer certainly hasn't been of any help to the trees, either."
