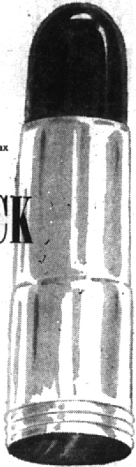

Two Leagues To Echo Cry, "Play Ball"

All the pomp and ceremony will accompany the opening day games of both Little and Intermediate league baseball Monday, June 16. Baseball fans will have their choice of three games being played Monday night in the two leagues as the second year Little League and the newly-formed Intermediate league get their full seasons under way.
City Manager Donald C. Egbert will catch the season's first ball from pitcher Dean G. Beier, Birmingham mayor, as intermediate league opens first at 6 p.m., St. James park. Athletic Director Frank Whitney will wield the bat for the city battery.
THEN THE mayor, city man-

ager and athletic director are expected to repeat their performance for the opening of the Little League Nationals at Knudsen field and the Americans at Harmon field. Both games are slated to start near 6:30.
In the Intermediate circuit, the opening day teams will be the Bel Aires and the Chiefs. Detroit Tiger General Manager Charley Gehringer is expected at that game to watch the young hopefuls.
A color guard of boys and Girl Scouts will march to the center of the field and the National Anthem will be played over the public address system to start the ceremonies.
In Little League play the Braves will meet the Cubs at Knudsen field and the Red Sox will play against the Indians at Harmon field.

W. Maple Tree Planting Plans Reviewed Briefly

"I think we should give some publicity to the tree-planting program and the new shrubs that are going to be planted along West Maple," V. B. Watkins told fellow Birmingham city commissioners Monday.

Mrs. Margaret C. Bradbury, Southfield township board member, has been appointed as the township's representative to the newly-formed Community Council.

Community Group Is for Study, President States

Mrs. Anne Garrison, retiring president of the Birmingham Community Council, answered by letter Monday city commissioner's questions raised at the June 2 commissary meeting.

In denying that the council had any power to finally decide community business, Mrs. Garrison stated that "the variety and number of organizations that belong to the council... make it a pretty unwieldy medium through which to obtain quick samplings of community opinion. Rather it is essentially a planning, coordinating and program-study committee."

COMMISSIONERS, apparently surprised when a report from the council failed to support the proposed municipal swimming pool, questioned the workings of the council and the amount of power that it could exert on community projects.

She further added that the council has specialized in recreation problems since it was organized and has done much to bring to light the facilities or lack of facilities that the city has offered recreation-wise.

A survey conducted through the efforts of the Youth Council, an organization sponsored by the Community Council, listed the pool as desired in their overall report, but gave at least 10 other projects preference over the pool.

COMMISSIONER Ralph A. Main had also questioned whether every organization represented on the council had been polled on their opinions of the proposed pool. He said that he had never heard of any such poll being conducted in any of the organizations.
