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Plan Board Denies Rezoning Request

The Birmingham plan board denied a petition by the Grand Trunk Western railroad to rezone a seven-acre parcel east of the railroad's right of way between Greenfield and Maple at a special meeting of the plan board Wednesday night, June 11. Petitioners sought a rezoning to business or multiple dwellings. The board recommended that a special assessment district be set up by the city commission to finance the developing of the land for a city park, in accordance with nearby resident requests. The petition of Frank Newell, 1108 Maple, owner of a piece of the land in question, also was rejected by the board.

Resident objection to the rezoning centered around the fear that it would result in lower property values and increase traffic in the area.

License Fee Back In League's Hands

City Commissioners Monday night rechecked the city's food ordinance and came up with the clause they sought in order to return to the League of Women Voters an \$8 fee for a permit to sell food.

The League asked to have the fee returned because their sale of food at Thursday's torchlight political rally was a non-profit seeking venture.

Commissioners at first believed they would have to stand behind the ruling as set up in the pending ordinance that states that all solicitations of food sellers required a city license.

THE REQUIRING

of a license for the Birmingham Lions Club ice cream sale and the fee for the League of Women Voters prompted commissioners to ask City Attorney Forbes Haskett to review the pending ordinance.

Commissioners questioned whether they had the right to refund payment of license fees in cases they believed warranted no license.

After City Clerk Irene Hanley pointed out that food goods are sold at many local athletic events without obtaining a license, Haskett explained that under the food ordinance no fee was required of fraternal, social or religious groups, which do not make a regular habit of selling food.

It was here that the commission decided to return the fee to the League and review more thoroughly the pending ordinance.
