Registration Total Reaches 10,800 as Over 1,000 Sign Up

There are only 700 non-registered eligible voters in Birmingham. Preliminary figures released by the Birmingham Republican committee after its week-long registration drive which ended Saturday show that approximately 10,800 men and women are able to vote in the August 5 primaries. Although final results are not yet available to give an accurate accounting of all new registrants, Monday City Clerk Irene Hanley estimated she registered more than 1,000 men and women. The drive lasted from June 4 to 14. "The 700 who still are not registered will be contacted again by committee representatives," said Chairman Richard C. VanDusen. "In a week our cardies will be up-to-date, and we will be able to concentrate on the still non-registered voters."

Although registrations end July 7, the committee's activities will not end there. "They will seek to better Birmingham's primary voting record in August, and they will turn their attention again to registering eligible voters after Aug. 5 for the November general election."

Baldwin Play Area Can Be Completed Before Fall Term

Work will be started shortly to complete the play area around the Baldwin elementary school. Edward Laird, representing Wilcox and Laird, landscape architects, presented final plans to the Birmingham board of education Tuesday. At an estimated cost of \$28,380 for labor and material. The plan also calls for the elimination of the steps at the school entrance, replacing them with a ramp-type approach. Laird explained that since the present approach will have to be replaced because of breakage, he feels the ramp type will be safer for smaller children. The area, he said, will be easier to keep clean and free from snow, and will eliminate many hazards for youngsters.

PLAYGROUND PLANS remain much the same as those presented several weeks ago. The plans call for sodded areas surrounding all play equipment, such as swings, greatly adding to the safety picture. Parents have protested the use of black topping these sections because of the dangers of falls. Laird told board members that the job would take about eight weeks and would be ready for the opening of school. The planting of new trees and shrubs and transplanting of others will not be done until late fall.

Bloomfield Hills, Township Launch Registration Drive

If you live in Bloomfield Hills or in Bloomfield township's first precinct and aren't registered to vote, you'll hear about it between now and July 7. Taking after Birmingham's Republicans, younger GOP groups in Bloomfield Hills and Bloomfield township are conducting their own registration drive. It began a week ago on a door-to-door basis, under the direction of John W. Eden of Bloomfield Hills and Charles T. Maloney of Bloomfield township.

BETWEEN THEM, Eden and Maloney direct a crew of about 75 young men and women who will work right up to 8 p.m. July 7 to increase the voting rolls in their separate precincts. Both men are candidates for precinct delegate to the county GOP convention in August. As preparation for the registration campaign, they have visited every house in their areas. "The door-to-door effort will continue to the final hour. But on Monday the group begins a concerted effort, complete with posterized, placard-laden cars, and a sound-truck, to make all persons aware of their status as voters," Maloney has not yet compiled registration figures for the first precinct. But Eden brings out

AT LATEST count, just 750 of 1,100 eligible voters were registered in Bloomfield Hills. "And a look at the city's voting record makes our job even more important," said Eden, "because they aren't registered they can't vote." "In the 1960 primary election, only 25 per cent of registered voters in Bloomfield Hills voted. And at the general election a mere 50 per cent turned out. "That means that a few more than 300 voters out of a possible 1,100 voted for gubernatorial candidate," said Eden.

"Bloomfield Hills, being a community of responsibility and responsibility, hasn't fulfilled its political responsibility in the past few years," he stated.

"WE ARE AIMING for 100 per cent registration, and at least a 95 per cent turnout at the primary and general elections," he said. The same objectives hold true for Maloney, whose precinct sprawls around Bloomfield Hills and Birmingham. "If they're over 21 and don't vote, it's stopped being their own business," he said. "The franchise may not be important to them, but if they fail to exercise it, it's important to all of us." "We want to change the lethargy that's existed about voting in these areas since the war."

Maloney has not yet completed his organization, but Eden has named four lieutenants to work with him in Bloomfield Hills. They are Suzanna Anderson, Phoebe Otter, Paul McKinney, and Tempin Licklider. Each lieutenant covers a single area, and is assisted by 10 aides.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS City Hall is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily from 8 a.m. to noon, Saturdays, and will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. July 7—the deadline for registrations. The township hall, on Telegraph road south of Long Lake, is open from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily, Saturday mornings, and also all day July 7, as required by state law.
