Cranbrook Summer Theatre School Set For Opening

Joining the Cranbrook Summer Theatre school for its eleventh season, opening next Monday, will be Barbara Hamel, formerly set designer and production assistant for Dumont television, and television consultant for leading network shows.

Miss Hamel, formerly a teaching fellow at the Department of Speech at the University of Michigan, has studied at the Rollins Theatre and the University of Birmingham, Stratford-on-Avon, and is a Master of Arts from the University of Michigan. She will teach speech and direct at Cranbrook.

The Theatre School will open with a record enrollment of over a hundred students ranging from 9 to 23 years of age. Classes each morning in the Greek Theatre and Cranbrook Pavilion will include voice, diction, pantomime, make-up and dancing.

The afternoon will be devoted to swimming and recreational activities in the Jonah pools. Weekly performances will be given in all divisions on Monday evenings, starting June 30, and final productions will start August 1.

Direction of the Theatre School for the eleventh straight year will fall to Carl G. Womberger of the Cranbrook faculty, and school and college credit will be given qualified students. Working assistants for older boys are available in many divisions.
