

**Two Firemen Resign; Salary Allowance Fund OK'd by Commissioners**

An additional salary allowance of \$300 for the Birmingham fire department has been approved by city commissioners. The increase is necessary because of the replacement of two resigning department members creates a "duplicate" of personnel during the training period of the new men.

Fire Chief V. W. Griffith said

vacancies had been created in the department through the resignations of Bruce Reynolds, 1844 Hayes, and Joseph Lamm, Jr., 517 Catalpa, who are entering private industry.

Newcomers to the department are Walters Edwards, 1287 Webster, and Robert Randall, 1287 Cole.

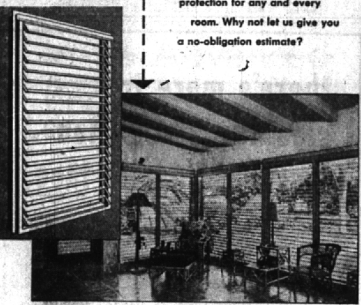
Griffith said the department personnel was increased by one man, Robert Ives, 707 Ruffner, last January.

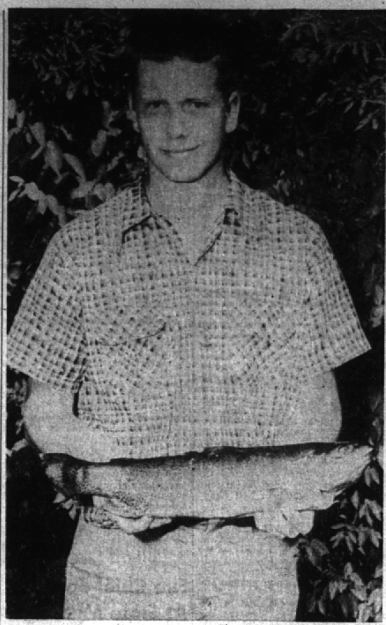

Have you ever noticed how many people follow the fire department to a fire?  
There is always a number of fire fans who like to see the fire department in action. While these people may not be aware of it, they are hindering the fire department in its various phases of fire fighting and while responding to an alarm. State laws direct that no one shall follow behind, or park, within 500 feet of fire apparatus, while responding to, or working at, a fire.

Very recently in a neighboring city a great loss of time and property was caused by spectators blocking streets so that fire apparatus could not get to the fire. The fire department had to cut the laying of fire lines, etc. Almost everyone likes to see a fire department in action, but remember when you see them or hear the sirens on the streets, pull over to the curb if you can or at least stop so they may pass without hindrance. Always remember there may be a life at stake.

If you are at a fire by accident or leave a traffic lane open for any additional apparatus and don't park near hydrants making them useless.  
Keep in mind that it could be your house, and you would want the fastest and best service possible, so remember, when you see the fire department coming, "Give us room."
