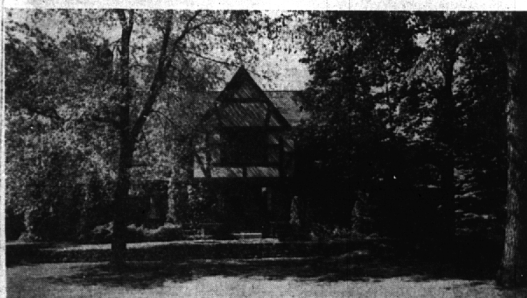

AN OLD FAMILY tradition was carried out at the reception.

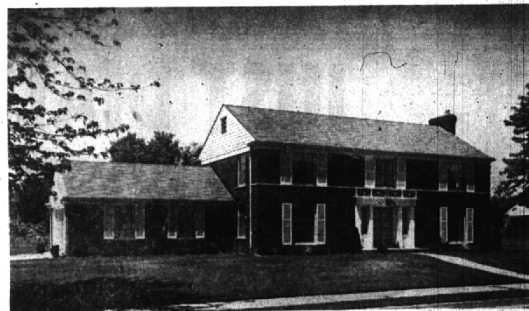
