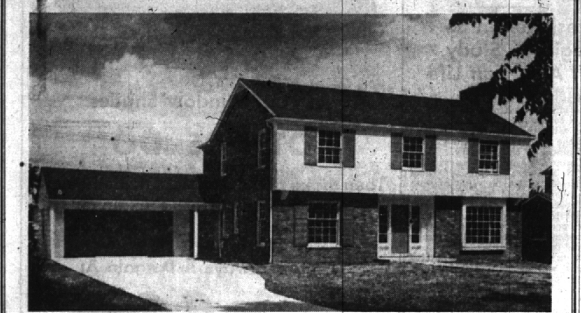

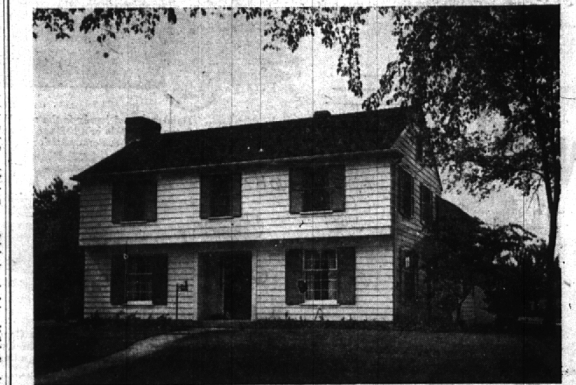
Mr. and Mrs. Duncan will be at home in East Lansing after the first of July.
