Commission Approves Fire-Police Work Plan

The Birmingham City Commission, at its meeting Monday night, reviewed and approved the proposals that the work week for the police and fire departments be reduced.

The present fire department work week of 73 1/2 hours is the maximum allowed under the state law which regulates the working hours of firemen. The law requires that fire departments operating on a platoon system shall provide every other day off with an additional provision that each 16th day the firemen are allowed an additional day off.

The proposed change in the fire department work week would constitute a 67.2 hour work week. It was recommended that the department operate on its present schedule until new personnel can be added.

THE RECOMMENDATION that the working hours of the fire department be revised to provide one relief day every 14 days to be effective October 1, 1952, and that the working hours be further revised on January 1, 1953, to provide one relief day every 10 days, resulting in a 67.2 hour work week, was approved by the city commission.

At the present time the police department is operating on a 48-hour work week. The change to a 40-hour week will be a gradual one, the first step to be effective October 1, 1952, will place the department on a 44-hour week.

A further change will become effective January 1, 1953, reducing the work week to 40 hours. This recommendation was also approved by the City Commission.

It is proposed that the departments make the change without additional personnel until the city budget authorizes the addition of such.
