The bride's going-away costume was a blue gray lightweight wool suit with white and blue accessories.



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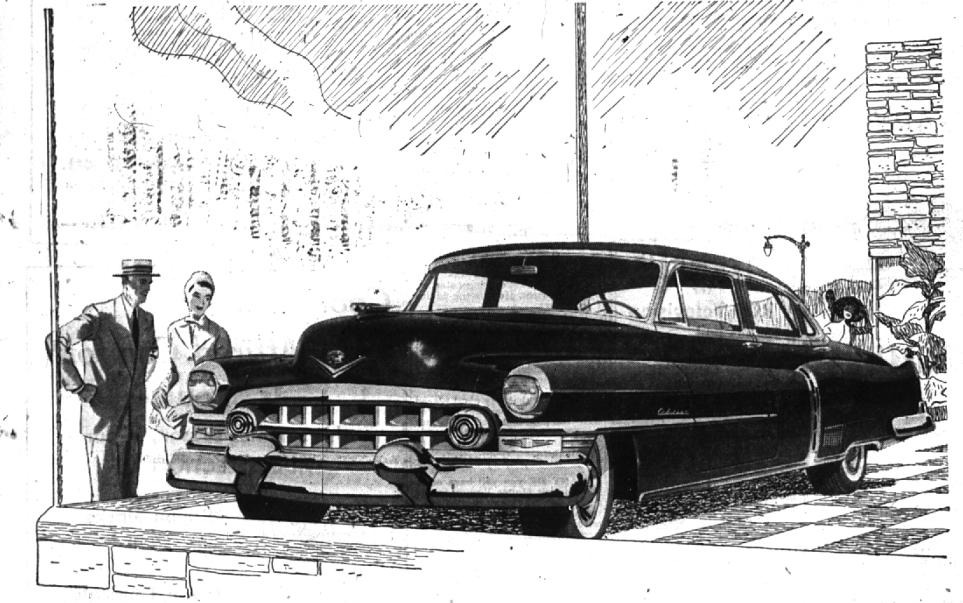
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
