**Albion Graduate Leaves for Italy With Church Group**

Max Cornell, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Cornell, 359 Townsend, is sailing from Montreal this week aboard S.S. Arosa Kuhn, to take part in an Ecumenical World Camp in Italy. Just graduated from Albion college, will assist in the construction of a Youth Center in the central part of Italy near Assisi.

He will be among 120 other young Americans who will be participating in the 27 Ecumenical World Camps in 15 countries, sponsored by the Youth department of the World Council of Churches.

Each camp will have representatives from several nations. Campers will work together on projects determined by the needs of the community in which the work camp is held. Projects will range from construction of church buildings in Austria, renovation of refugee hospitals in Germany, building of youth centers in Italy, Belgium and France, to the digging of irrigation ditches in Greece and road building in Japan.

In addition to the manual work, campers will visit local communities, take part in group discussions and conduct church services. The Americans represent 15 Protestant denominations and 30 states.

**Sunday Sermonette**  
**"Led by the Spirit"**  
 A Continuing Series by Local Religious Leaders

"For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the Sons of God" (Romans 8:14).

Led and not driven. Led as the scholar by his teacher; the traveler by his guide; the soldier by his captain. God's sons have a family likeness. As the botanist declares that by certain similarities a plant belongs to such an order—the geologist says that such a fossil belongs to a certain stratum—the physiologist declares in the same manner that such an animal belongs to such a species—so then it is not an outward, but inward resemblance.

God's sons are outwardly different. They may appear like Joseph, swaying and managing the affairs of a mighty empire or like the poor, Jew Nazarene, sitting despised at the king's gate. Some may be as Solomon, arrayed in all his beauty or like Lazarus, clothed in rags and dying of starvation. They may appear light mighty St. Paul, great in intellect, or as Moses who was slow in speech.

STILL THROUGH all differences there is the bond of likeness. They are influenced by the Holy Spirit and this likeness is only seen by the man of Spiritual vision and spiritual enlightenment.

Only the botanist can tell to what order the plant belongs. Only the man well acquainted with the family can tell when he meets a member.

Only the spiritually enlightened can pick out one of God's sons. The Son of God is led—and not led into sin. How foolish it would be for Christ to die to save us from sin and then lead some into sin.

AS THE strong undercurrent may propel the vessel along the waters, so the strong current of the Holy Spirit guides us as sons of God through the troubled waters of the world.
