Consider Set Up Of Block Wardens For City Defense

Birmingham's civil defense council, meeting last week, laid the basis for the organization of a block warden system for the city.

The meeting also brought up the possibility of the formation of a medical control center at St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac.

Dr. Robert J. Wessels, 3000 Larchline, said this would be used only as a center through which Birmingham doctors could be given information as to where they should report. The hospital, he explained, would handle only severely injured persons because of lack of space.

Doctors practicing in Birmingham would be working at Red Cross stations, he said.

He was found by a road contractor, Ben Fyke, who was working on plans in the opening of a road through the woods for a new subdivision. Fyke contacted a nearby neighbor, Harold Chalmers of Lone Pine road, who summoned police.

Pontiac Fisherman Drowning Victim

A Pontiac man was the victim of a drowning Friday, May 30, while wading in the water fishing from a make-shift raft on Newcombe Lake, between Telegraph and Echo road in Bloomfield township.

The body of the dead man, Isaac Harris, 503, was not recovered until Saturday after sheriff department officers and township police dragged the lake until 8 a.m. Friday.

Isaac's companion, Claude McMillan, also of Pontiac, told police that Harris fell into the water from a box on the raft and failed to get back on the raft. McMillan returned to Pontiac and notified the sheriff's department of the accident.
