Ned Sharples ran a good 440 to tie the Pierce track record at 5:32.3 in his last dual meet.

In their highest jump of the season at 5 ft. 8 1/2 in. Dave Bowen and Mikey Plumstead were in a three-way tie for first with Tom Russell of Port Huron.

Bowen also shot 49 ft. 7 in. to take first and remain undefeated in dual meets.

Starting for the Big Red was Jerry Thomas with firsts in the 100 and 220 yd. dashes, the pole vault and the broad jump.

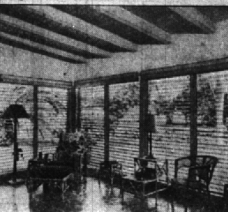
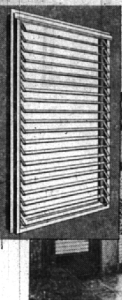
