Cranbrook Rackets Win Championship

The Cranbrook varsity tennis team won its fourth straight tennis league match last Saturday, May 31st, against Shady Side Academy of Pittsburgh, Penn., by a score of 4-1 to capture the coveted Inter-State League Championships.

Shaw Emmons, playing first singles for Cranbrook, defeated John Stubbins 6-1, 6-2. Captain Ken Wilson downed Shady Side's Pete Runney 7-5, 6-2 for the second singles victory of the afternoon.

Tom Plum of the Cranes suffered the only loss of the day as he fell to Al Breckinridge 6-2, 7-5. Cranbrook's strong doubles teams completely romped their Shady Side opponents. Steve Stubbins and Ted Price, playing first doubles for the Cranes, defeated Ted Davies and Bud Lebowitz 6-1, 6-0, while Parker and Milbrand downed Warren and Lacey by the same score.

The three victories by Emmons, Stubbins and Price, and Parker and Milbrand enabled these men to remain undefeated in Inter-State League competition. The victory brought Cranbrook's season record to 12 wins against 2 defeats.

On Friday and Saturday, May 23rd and 24th, the varsity gained 9 1/2 points to bring their total Birmingham with 11 points in the Regional Tournament held at Cranbrook. Freshman Shaw Emmons of Dayton, Ohio, and senior player Sandy Kaplan, both singles finalists, were the only Crane representatives for the State Tournament to be held at Kalamazoo tomorrow and Saturday.

Shaw gained his position following a bye from Jerry Kraus and a victory over Johnson 6-2, 6-2, both of Birmingham. He was then forced to defeat his teammate Sandy Kaplan, 6-0, 6-0 from the other bracket. Kaplan had earlier defeated George of Lapeer and Emery 8-6, 7-5.

Cranbrook Runners Take Second Place In League Meeting

In the 22nd Annual Inter-State Preparatory League Track and Field Meet, held at University School in Shaker Heights, Ohio, May 31, Cranbrook placed second with a total of 217 points.

Western Reserve Academy of Hudson, Ohio, won the meet with a total of 51.6 points. Sandy Side Academy of Pittsburgh, Penn. University School and Nichols School of Buffalo, New York placed third, fourth and fifth respectively.

Dick Deskin captured Cranbrook's first place in the 440-yard dash with a time of 52.9 seconds. Dave Noe tied with Deskin for Cranbrook's high point man with a second in the 220 yard dash, third in the 100 yard dash and a leg on the 880 yard relay team which finished third. In the 880 yard run Doug Richmond, John Helsey and Charley Chase took second, third and fourth places for Cranbrook. Bill Yag came in second in the 180 yard hurdles with a time of 22 seconds.

Pune Patton captured second place in the discus with a throw of 134 feet. Patton also took third place in the shot put. In the high jump Jim Stadler tied for second place and Bill Yag finished in a five way tie for fourth place.

STADLER TOOK FOURTH place in the 120 yard high hurdles in a time of 17.2 seconds. Cranbrook's 880 yard relay team composed of Ned Bearden, Bill Chase, John Yag and Dick Deskin set a new Cranbrook record with a time of 3 minutes and 40.5 seconds while finishing third in that event.

Deskin ran a 52.7 quarter mile in the anchor leg of the Chase brook scoring for the day.

Saturday, June 7th, Cranbrook will meet Hazzard High School at 2 p.m. in the Cranbrook Oval, for the last dual meet of the season.
