ADD A NOTE

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Play It Safe!

Many residences and business places in the City of Birmingham have no street number exposed on the front of them or in many cases, if the numbers are there, they are obscured by shrubbery or are put in a place too low for quick observance.

WHERE A FIRE has burned to an extent that it has exposed itself and flames or smoke are visible on the approach, the house numbers are not important. But the majority of the calls answered by the Fire Department in the city of Birmingham are of the nature mentioned first, and proper house numbering is therefore all-important to the homeowner as well as the Department.

Be sure that your house number, if it is not as described below, is brought up to these standards:

- 1) Use at least 3-inch numbers and where space is available, use 4-inch.
- 2) Use a number in color contrast, such as black with white or white with black. If a home is of brick veneer, mount the numbers on a small white or black board that makes a neat unit.
- 3) LOCATE THE NUMBERS on the house within a foot or two of the upper half of the door that opens on the street the numbers are assigned to.
- 4) The best and most practical location for house numbers near a door is in a location where the electric light over or at the side of the door will illuminate the numbers at night. This eliminates the necessity of searching for them with a spotlight during the hours of darkness. Then be sure when you call for emergency service at night, you turn this porch light on.
- 5) If you desire to place a house number on a lawn somewhere near shrubbery, duplicate that same number in the location described above.
- 6) If you do not know your proper house number in the City of Birmingham, call the Building Inspection Department of the City which will give you your proper number.

Don't put off correcting a bad set of numbers on your house until next week, for that may be too late.
