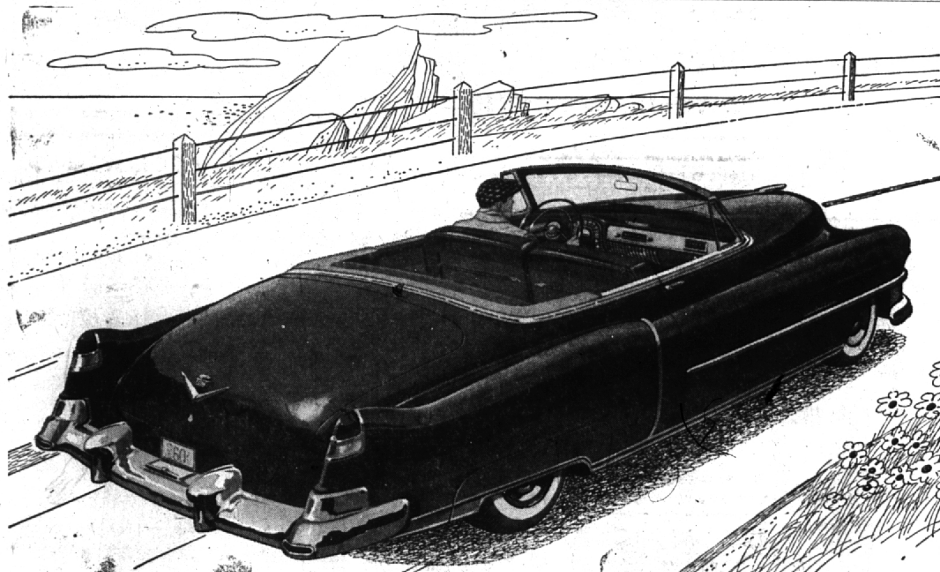

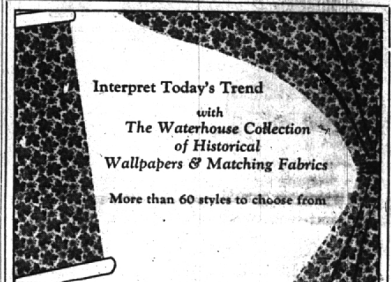

### Writes Article For 'Monitor'

"Children and 'Prettied-up Posies'" is the title of article in the May 17 issue of The Christian Science Monitor, written by Gladys Gage Dibble (Mrs. Lewis Dibble, 1100 West Lincoln.)

Mrs. Dibble strongly urges parents to let their children have flowers of their own, flowers to grow and flowers to arrange for daily display around the home as well as for special events of the family.

Her article points out the thrill youngsters get out of performing an "adult" task. They have their own sense of beauty and their own ideas on how to do the job, but find that it is nearly always assigned to mother or some other adult member of the family.

"Let the child select the container to be used," she says, "but try to have on hand flowers which will stand repeated handling without crushing and dropping their petals."

**TRY NEVER** to give advice that is not asked for nor help that is not needed, she suggests. Young arrangers often show a work that is charming in its spontaneity and inventiveness. They have the courage to go beyond what is commonly used, the grouping of new colors and the mixing of flower varieties, she points out.

A basic suggestion of design can help a child who seems to not know where to start or begin the arrangement, but the main part should be left to the child. Mrs. Dibble's article cites several instances in her own family and among friends who have watched their children develop a deep satisfaction from this particular field of expression and strongly urges others to try it.
