Seek Formula For Clearing Quorton Of Weed Growth
Future treatment of Quorton Lake weed growth may depend on terms the city can come to with the Applied Bio Chemists and Associates firm.

The city commission, faced again this year with annoying weeds and other plant growth in the Quorton waters, has received a quotation from the firm stating a cost of \$1,200 to chemically treat the lake for the second consecutive year.
Commissioners, believing that the lake has already cost the city a considerable amount, seek for its own use the chemical formula used by the Wisconsin firm.

CITY MANAGER Donald C. Egbert was instructed to contact the firm to see if the company will give the city the formula after treating the lake this year.
If a satisfactory arrangement cannot be made between city and the chemists, the commission may appropriate the \$1,200 to be used by city employees to experiment with clearing the lake.

To Pay Share On Defaulted Bonds
A cash balance of \$2,247 will be applied to 19 special assessment districts for which a total bonded debt of \$77,921.50 is outstanding. It was decided by the city commission Monday night.
City Treasurer Russell Berger was instructed to make partial payments on all outstanding bonds in these districts in ratio to the amount of money available in each district.
City Attorney Forbes S. Hascall drafted a resolution giving Berger the right to make final payments to bond holders on the prorated scale.

Manager To Study New Plat Request

Construction of a light manufacturing plant and the proposed building of a second plant in the area necessitates the laying of the main for better fire protection. City Manager Donald C. Egbert said, Egbert recommended that the line be stopped at this point and not continued until additional settlement takes place in the ground fill.

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
