

Second In State Swimming Meet

Fighting desperately until the last event, the Birmingham high school swimming team came within a single point of the championship in the state class B finals at East Lansing Saturday, scoring 42 points against the 43 rolled up by defending champion East Grand Rapids in a meet that kept the spectators on the edge of the seats every minute.

Third place winner was Adrian with 38 points, followed by River Rouge with 34; University high school, Ann Arbor, 19; Trenton, 18; Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills, 12; Ypsilanti Roosevelt, 11; Dearborn Lowry, 10; and Edson Institute of Dearborn, 8.

MAPLE TANKMEN captured

The state meet marked the termination of the high school swimming careers for four of the best tankmen in the history of Birmingham swim teams. Jerry Newman and Gary Osterbeck have been the squad mainstays during the entire season.

Fletcher holds the school record for the individual medley; Joslyn holds the Barnum pool record for the 50 yard free style and is a member of the record-holding free style relay quartet; Osterbeck has the school 100 yard free style record and also is on the free style relay team; and Newman has been one of the most dependable performers all season and swims a fast leg of the free style relay.

The performances of these four boys coupled with the tremendous desire and ability of the entire squad made the 1952 season one that will go down in history as one of Birmingham's best.
