Tentative Troy School Budget Set at \$426,000

A tentative budget of \$426,000 for the next year has been submitted to the Troy township school board by Superintendent Stuart Baker. It will be studied by members during the next month and will be approved at the April meeting.

The budget calls for a \$38,000 increase over the \$388,000 total for the past year. Baker stated that seven additional teachers will be hired.

The board last week also voted to call in \$26,000 in bonds on Big Beaver and Log Cabin school districts. Of the bonds which are not yet due, \$16,000 from Big Beaver district and \$10,000 from Log Cabin are to be called in.

Baker said that bonds come due for \$5,000 from Big Beaver and \$2,000 for Log Cabin.
