Rabbi B. Benedict Glazer, Ph.D., of Temple Beth El, Detroit, will speak on "Maltreatment in 1952" at the Mar. 31 meeting of the St. James Men's club.

Chairman of the Wayne county committee on mental hygiene, Dr. Glazer has been named to several state committees by Gov. G. Mennen Williams.
