Cranbrook Tours South In 19 Game Baseball Schedule

Plans for the third annual Southern trip and a 19-game regular baseball schedule for Cranbrook School have been announced by Athletic Director Paul A. Thompson.

Six games are on tap for the Cranes in this year's swing through North Carolina and Virginia. New to the list are Covington High School, Woodberry Forest School, and Staunton Military Academy in Virginia, and Burlington and Chapel Hill High Schools in North Carolina. Only Henderson (N. C.) High School is a hold-over from 1951.

Coach Fred Campbell will again have a rather young ball club this year, with most of the experience being tied up in the infield. Returning for a fourth year will be the second-base combination of Capt. John Hatch, at shortstop, and John Edison, at second.

THE 17-YEAR-OLD Hatch has missed only one inning of play since his freshman year, and both boys have played over 60 games for Cranbrook. Rounding out the infield will be veteran first-baseman Harry Lomason, a junior, and Don Slotkin, a husky sophomore. The outfield will be relatively inexperienced, with only letterman Mark Smith contending with youngsters Larry Ashbury, Colvin Cochran, and Joe Prendergast for the starting spots. The bulk of the catching will be handled by Jim Paterson, a senior. The pitching will be handled by a four-man staff. Returning from 1951 are senior Dick Sargent and junior Bill Soter. New to the mound are junior Bob Newey,

(twice a letterman in the infield, and a sophomore left-hander, Martin Goldman.
