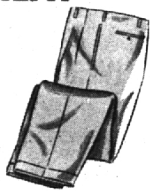

No Sunday Sales For Southfield's Used Car Owners

The Southfield township board, fearful of the many applications for used car lot sales and mindful of action in other Michigan counties enforcing regulations on existing used car sales, passed an ordinance Tuesday night preventing the sale of either new or used cars on Sunday.

Only board member Thomas Langan opposed the ordinance by stating that the township "was attempting to stop progress and was hurting the business man."

"I UNDERSTAND that Floyd Rice would have televised his car lot on Sundays if allowed to do business," Langan stated. "This would have brought people to Southfield and helped business."

Floyd Rice, Detroit automobile dealer, recently sought to gain township approval for a used car sales lot on the southwest corner of Telegraph and Northwestern. No action has been taken on the request.

The board, at the same time, denied the application of William L. Kollinger to sell used cars next to his gas station at the corner of Ten Mile and Northwestern.

The ordinance will take effect in 30 days and carry a maximum penalty of \$100 fine, 30 days imprisonment, or both.

Tentatively, Hills Budget Up Slightly

Bloomfield Hills city commissioners took a preview look at the 1952-53 fiscal budget and found that an increase in municipal operating costs, like living costs, has upped the budget slightly.

The commission passed a tentative budget of \$120,930 as compared with last year's budget of \$116,800. If this figure is approved, the rate will be approximately \$14.95 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Last year's rate was \$14 per thousand.

A public hearing on the budget has been called for Wednesday, May 28.

Estes' Nominating Petitions Filed

Howard R. Estes, Republican, of Birmingham, this week filed his nominating petition with the County Clerk at Pontiac, thus qualifying him as a candidate for re-election as state representative from this district. At the moment, Estes has no Republican opposition.

Marvin Kuschnisky of Troy Township has filed his petition for the same office on the Democratic ticket. Four years ago Kuschnisky unsuccessfully ran against Estes.

Estes has represented Birmingham ever since the district was established in 1941 and confidently expects to win again this year.

According to reports from Lansing, he probably will be the next Speaker of the House, succeeding Victor C. Knox, of Sault Ste. Marie, who is running for Congress from the Upper Peninsula.

'More Important Things' Draw Traffic Engineers From Bham. Problem

Police Chief Ralph Moxley said this week he did not know when the state highway department survey on the Lincoln-Hunter-Woodward bottleneck would be completed.

In November, 1950, traffic engineers started to make a study to relieve the hazardous condition existing at the juncture of Woodward and Hunter, just north of Lincoln. About seven lanes of heavy traffic converge into four.

Moxley said the study continued for only a brief time and was then sidetracked by state officials for "more important things." He said he had had no indication when the project would be taken up again.

Riley told officers that the children darted into the path of his car. He was released after making a statement to Oakland County

No Action Taken On Liquor Permits In Southfield

The awaited report from Southfield township's liquor committee concerning the permission of additional liquor licenses in the township, was delayed Tuesday night for lack of replies from applicants.

Only 12 of the 19 applicants for new licenses have returned questionnaires mailed to them.

A letter from Rev. Harvey M. Luce, secretary of the Southfield Ministerial Association, asking that no more licenses be granted in the township, was read to the board.

Supervisor William Roesser said that the board would consider the matter at the next meeting if all questionnaires had been returned.

Under new population figures the township may add six new licenses to the six it already has.

Want Escrow Account For Temporary Sewer

City Engineer L. R. Gare has been asked to prepare an escrow amount estimate for city commissioners and Carl F. Metz, 185 Westwood.

Metz has asked that he be permitted a temporary sewer service for a home he is building on Redding road, until such time as a sewer is installed along that road.

Commissioners indicated that his request would be granted providing an escrow account was established to meet his estimated cost of the Redding sewer.
